The Washington State Apple Crop is in the final 3 to 4 months left of shipping. The 2022/23 crop will finish slightly more than 100 Mil boxes, which is much less than the 122 Mil boxes finished in 2022. Due to a shortage of availability, weekly shipments have been much lower than usual. Top 5 Apples for Foodservice: **Red Delicious**, for instance, has 1.5 Mil fewer boxes than it did at the same time last year. Peak sizes are 113s and 125s, with 88s and larger still maintaining higher prices. Quality is good. **Gold Delicious** has 220,000 fewer boxes than last year. Quality at the end of the year has been excellent. **Granny Smith** has 2.6 Mil fewer boxes than at this time last year. They have been scarce this season, and costs have been higher than usual. Quality has been good all year, and as the state enters the summer months, the quality will continues to get better. **Gala** is the only variety with 1.1 Mil more than this time last year. Making it to the New Crop Galas this year will not be a problem. **Fujis** is roughly the same as this time last year. Quality has been good. New Crop Washington State apples will be delay 1-2 weeks later than previous season due to the late bloom caused by the cold weather in spring. The new crop estimate has not been sent out to the industry, but rumor has it in the 122 Mil range.

QUALITY FAIR Domestic asparagus is coming to an end. Idaho and Washington are done. There is pressure in this region due to a lack of availability, since Michigan is quickly ending, and Canada will be finished in 2 weeks. Yield in Peru is down by 60-70% due to the excessive rain and heat in the past few months. Sizing is primarily small to large, with XL and jbo being limited. Central Mexico has stated with small volume and some delay due to lack of rain. Since rainfall is common during this time of year in central Mexico, the lack of rain has a significantly impacted the growth. Rain isn't in the forecast for the next 2-3 weeks. Supplies will be a challenge going into July. Supplies are expected to get better mid-July. Recommend being flexible with sizing at time of loading and propose substituting green beans or broccoli.

Mexico has exceeded the anticipated weekly volume most weeks this spring but will see a drastic shift this week. Negra/late season fruit is wrapping up and transitioning to higher elevation. The higher the elevation, the less available orchids to harvest; about 30% less this week compared to the previous three weeks. There is no predetermined timetable for when the lower elevations will begin harvesting the Flora Loca crop because it is dependent on the dry matter of the fruit. The Loca crop size curve is expected to be heavy to small fruit, with the US relying on the high elevation/Negra crop for size. Jalisco harvesting may begin in the coming weeks, depending on dry matter, and is expected to favor small fruit.

Limes: While yields remain elevated, the market has stabilized. Recent rain events have aided fruit growth and color, but they may also result in conditioned flaws such as styler-end breakage and oil spots which can show days after initial shipment. With limited volume anticipated for large sizes until the current production cycle ends towards the second half of July, the crop is at its peak for small and mid-sized fruit. Pricing per size has nearly bottomed out and is likely to remain steady through the second or third week of July. Extreme heat and humidity throughout the summer will have a significant influence on quality and shelf life, which will eventually affect yields and availability.

Lemons: Weather has been holding up. Shippers will try to stretch current supplies to the end of June. Some very late ranches in D1, but this year will end a little early. Fruit is sizing up. Rain has hurt pack-outs for many growers. Peaking on 115s. 140s Fancy are tight as this is the size/grades preferred by national retailers. Argentina will start in June.

Oranges: Navels are projecting to end mid-June. Brix is nice with an excellent color. Size is still small and will continue until the end of the Navel season. Peaking on 88s with very limited 48s/56s.

As is to be expected from this region, quality will likely have some exterior scarring but should be fine. Current brix ranges from 12-14%. Suggest being flexible at time of loading.

Potatoes will shrink somewhat during storage due to water loss. Remaining supplies are Burbank, which typically have a smaller size profile than Norkotah, therefore, its anticipated that the remaining supplies will have a smaller size profile than those shipped earlier in the season. This indicates that, while there is still availability in the 40s to 60s, as the season progresses, there will be further pressure on the market. Growers were able to get into the field to evaluate the progress of the new crop after a couple of weeks delay due to the abnormal winter. They are reporting good soil temp which means the potatoes are coming up slightly faster than last year. Because of the delayed planting, there may be a gap in August between the old and new crops. Overall, it seems to be a week or two weeks later than usual. This will also affect precut.

Extreme alert for Celery as seeders and other quality issues continues to be challenged in production and expected to be very limited for a few weeks. Brussels sprouts are on extreme alert due to Mexico finishing up and waiting for Central California to start. With the recent wind and rain in the Southeast region, Bell Peppers, Corn, Cucumbers, Yellow Squash, and Zucchini market could get a bit tight. Good time to promote Broccolini, Cauliflower, Green and Red Leaf.

Targeting Gen Z consumers? It's not so simple

There's a reason nearly every brand is trying to figure out Gen Z consumers' sweet spot right now. The demographic makes up nearly 70 million Americans, or about 20% of the U.S. population, and has amassed \$360 billion in disposable income.

This perhaps explains why the session "The Gen Z Effect: Redefining Dining Choices and New Experiences for a New Generation" at the National Restaurant Association Show attracted a standing-room-only crowd. The session was presented by Lindsay Lyons, group director of customer strategic insights at The Coca-Cola Company, and Robert Byrne, director of consumer and industry insights at Technomic. Their lede? A simple reminder that the generation is far from homogenous, which is a detail that often gets lost in the chase.

"They are 13-to-24, which comes with a wide spectrum of wants and needs," Lyons said.

For added context, the younger consumers in this demographic tend to be more trendy and less eco conscious. Ages 15-to-18 are an "inflection point," where these consumers start to drive and make money. At 18, when many go to college or start working full-time, they become more influenced by social issues, they're more convenience seeking and they're more likely to cook.

Essentially, the older cohort of Gen Z prioritizes convenience, while the younger cohort is looking for social, fun experiences and "a vibe." That said, they're also extremely health conscious, but they define that focus much differently than their predecessors.

"Healthy to them is comprehensive – it means things like balance, hygiene, diet, exercise, sleep, therapy. Doing things they want to do. It also means immunity, focus, natural, hydration, all of that together," Lyons said.

Of course, they're also digital and Byrne notes this is the demographic where digital curiosity is moving into digital dependency. However, that doesn't necessarily mean they want their entire world, including restaurants, to be fully digital. In fact, Byrne said expectations versus reality for this age group may be a bit surprising compared to their older peers. Consider that 23% of Gen Zers find food delivered via robot to be unappealing, for instance, while 38% find it to be appealing. This is compared to the 22% of millennials who find food delivered via robot to be unappealing, while 45% find it to be appealing.

Further, 30% of Gen Zers find food delivered via drone to be unappealing, while 32% find it to be appealing, versus 23% and 48% of millennials, respectively. As for those robot servers? Just 32% of Gen Zers find them to be appealing, versus 47% of millennials. What does this mean?

"Be careful with your extension of technology. There may be less receptivity to technology than one might think," Byrne said.

Value consciousness

One of the most important attributes sought by Gen Z is value, as 46% of these consumers have a second job according to Deloitte research. Byrne said price consciousness is based on necessity as many of these consumers are living hand-to-mouth.
